May 6, 1935, – Three teachers that had married, two of them permanent teachers, Mrs. Ayland and Mrs. Gernandt, and had signed the promise to resign at the discretion of the Board, were insisting upon holding their positions under the teacher tenure law of California. After a lengthy discussion and conversation with these two teachers, it was finally unanimously adopted that they would be granted contracts for the school year 1935-36.

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May 16, 1935 – the Board passed the following resolution: "That it will be the policy of the Ontario School Board in the future to ask all teachers who have reached the age of 65 years and who are eligible for a pension to resign from the Ontario Schools.'

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
